Topic: Threats to International Peace and Security Caused by Terrorist Acts

1 *The Security Council,*

2
3 *Reaffirming* its commitment to the dismantling of terrorist organizations as expressed in S/RES/2249,

4
5 *Stressing the inherent dignity, equal and inalienable rights of all peoples as determined by the Universal*
6 *Declaration of Human Rights*

7
8 *Reminding* ailing Member States of the body's voluntary actors, and these Member States' resources left to their
9 disposition through agreements as recent as S/RES/2170 from allied partners within the United Nations (UN),

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11 *Drawing attention* to the original UN Mandate which asserts that all Member States are viable recipients for
12 international assistance in response to challenges and crises such as attacks from violent non-state actors,

13
14 *Recognizing* the increased security measures applied to air travel security since September 11th attack,

15
16 Recognizing the unfortunate downing of the Russian flagged carrier, MetroJet, which demonstrates the increasingly
17 dire need for heightened airport and onboard security implementation by Member States,

18
19 *Acknowledging* the necessity to foster and promote regional cooperation and collaboration as well as international
20 counterterrorism capabilities in order to mitigate and reduce transnational illicit financial flows, which facilitate the
21 existence of nefarious groups such as ISIL in accordance with S/RES/1373,

23 *Reaffirming* the principles of S/RES/2195 which states the importance of border security of Member States in order
24 to prevent the dangers of porous borders and the illicit financial flows which such borders facilitate,

26 *Noting* the importance of preventing violent non-state actors from acquiring funds through donations and illegal
27 activities such as arms, drugs and human trafficking, in accordance with S/RES/1624,

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29 *Bearing in mind* the impact of regional vulnerabilities, trends, and priorities on the implementation of international
30 policies and standards A/RES/60/288,

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32 *Recalling* the arms embargo, travel ban and asset freezes instated by S/RES/2161 (2014) as it applies to ISIL, Al-
33 Nusra Front (ANF), and all other violent non-state actors and associated entities,

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35 *Acting* under Chapter VII of the Charter of the United Nations,

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37 1. *Authorizes* the use of force, by Member States, against the terrorist organization ISIL, ANF, and their affiliates
38 in order to restore peace and security to the Syrian Arab Republic, the Republic of Iraq and the Horn of Africa

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40 2. *Reaffirms* the principles of S/RES/2170 which delineates the capability of Member States which are directly
41 affected by terrorism to request assistance from the international community in the form of financial,
42 humanitarian, and peacekeeping aid;

44 3. *Expresses* hope that Member States with the capability to contribute military and financial assistance to help
45 support pre-existing endemic combat operations of violent Non-State Actors (NSAs) by volunteering assistance
46 and to communicate with those Member States directly affected by terrorism;

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48 4. *Recommends* Member States increase airport security through:

- 49
50 a. The implementation of full body scans especially in high risk flights corresponding to destination
51 and relevant intelligence information;

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- 53 b. The installation of surveillance cameras on planes that will have the ability to live stream
54 movements within the cabin in the event of an emergency for increased investigative and response
55 capabilities;
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- 57 5. *Requests* increased international funding from all Member States to be allocated to the Counter Terrorism
58 Implementation Task Force (CTITF) in order to promote inter-state communication and information sharing of
59 pertinent terrorist information;

- 61 6. *Urges* all Member States to increase border control forces and checkpoints throughout their territory in order to
62 combat international terrorism finance and recruitment networks;

- 64 7. *Encourages* support for the Organization of the Islamic Cooperation (OIC) in their focus against regional
65 terrorism and the promotion of bilateral cooperation between them and the League of Arab States in order to
66 combat Islamic extremist groups;

- 68 8. *Decides* to remain actively seized of the matter.
